
"Noah? Is that who the story is about? I love this story," Izzy declared.

"Let me tell the next part," begged Izzy. "I love the part about the animals."


"Be my guest," said Gram.

This would be a good place to insert **The Animals Came in Two-by-Two**. *Note: After the game is completed, use a "Call to Order" technique to settle the children.*




"Then the rains came, and not only rain from the heavens, but the Bible says that all the springs of the great deep burst forth."


"Thanks a lot." Pointing at Liam, Gram asked, "Can you do any better?"
