"I realize I'm a genius and all, but I admit I don't have a clue about what notions are," teased Liam.



"Remember how I've told you that God and the Bible often use symbols to represent other things," reminded Gram.



"Well as a matter of fact, he did," answered Gram. "Why would you guess that, Liam?"


"His name was Lot, wasn't it? Naturally, he wanted a lot." Liam grinned at his joke.

Izzy answered, "Seventy-five years, right?"


"Right," said Gram. "And now twenty-four years have passed."

"Yes, she did," answered Gram. "God told Abraham to name the baby Isaac. The name Isaac actually means laughter."


