Key Verse: Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the



"Let me see," said Izzy. Izzy walked over to Liam's computer and began to read out loud.


"Behold the days come, saith the LORD, that I will raise unto David a righteous Branch, and a King shall reign and prosper, and shall execute judgment and justice in the earth."

"Yeah, I remember that from the chart Liam made for the last story you told us," said Izzy.




"Right. And now we know the Redeemer will be a descendant of King David," said Gram.

Gram began her story. "As you know, Mary, the mother of Jesus, was pledged in marriage to a man named Joseph."


"That's like being engaged, right?" Izzy knew a lot about this story and was eager to contribute.

Gram reached for her Bible and began thumbing through the pages. "Mary had the same question for the angel. That's the wonder of the birth of Jesus. It was a miracle."





Izzy asked, "Were they mad at Him?"


