

"I'm happy to meet you both and I'm glad you like my dress." Abby twirled in a circle. "Your grandmother did a beautiful job on it."


"Did she happen to tell you lots of Bible stories about marriage?" questioned Liam. "That's what she's been doing with us while she was working on your dress."

"Uh oh," announced Liam. "Look at Gram's face. I know that look. Watch out. A story is brewing in her mind at this very moment."



"Goodness," exclaimed Abby. "I'm glad I don't have to wait until that happens before I can get married. How long did that take?"



Some of this was new information to Izzy. "Return? What do you mean return? Jesus is coming back again?"


"Yes, He is. Where is Jesus now, Izzy?" asked Gram.


